REPORT OF THE UNITED STATES COURT OF APPEALS FOR THE ARMED FORCES

October 1, 2022, to September 30, 2023

The Judges of the United States Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces submit their Annual Report on the administration of the Court and military justice during the October 2022 Term of Court to the Committees on Armed Services of the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives, and to the Secretaries of Defense, Homeland Security, Army, Navy, and Air Force in accordance with Article 146a, Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), Title 10, United States Code, § 946a.

THE BUSINESS OF THE COURT

During the October 2022 Term of the Court, the Court issued opinions in 25 of 26 orally argued cases prior to the end of the Term. One case, *United States v. Brown*, No. 22-0249/CG, was carried over into the October 2023 – September 2024 Term of Court. A summary by the Court staff of selected decisions is presented in *Appendix A*. Statistical reporting and graphical representations of the filing and disposition of cases are set forth in *Appendix B*.

At the beginning of the term, the Court remained at a quorum of four Judges. Because a replacement had yet to be confirmed and appointed, Chief Judge Kevin A. Ohlson called upon the Court's Senior Judges pursuant to Article 142(e), UCMJ, to conduct essential business of the Court and hear cases set for argument on the master docket. Senior Judge Andrew S. Effron heard 4 cases; Senior Judge Scott W. Stucky heard 4 cases; Senior Judge Susan J. Crawford heard 4 cases; and Senior Judge Charles E. Erdmann heard 2 cases. The Court resumed normal operations with a full complement of five Judges upon the appointment and taking of the Judicial Oath by Judge M. Tia Johnson on January 3, 2023.

Information pertaining to specific opinions is available from the Court's published opinions and Daily Journal, available on the Court's website. Other dispositions may be found in the Court's official reports, the Military Justice Reporter, and on the Court's website. Additionally, the Court's website contains a consolidated digest of past opinions of the Court, information on the Court's history and jurisdiction, the Rules of Practice and Procedure, previous Annual Reports, a schedule of upcoming hearings, audio recordings of past hearings, and information on clerkship opportunities, bar admission, electronic filing, and the Court's library.

RULES OF PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE

During the October 2022 Term, the Court began a long-term effort to overhaul the Court's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Already promulgated are changes to Rules 3A, 13(b), 13A, 15(b), 19(a)(7)(B), 21(b), 21(f), 24(b), 27(b), 36, 37(b)(2), 38(a), 39(a), and the Guidelines for Electronic Filing of Pleadings. These changes and the reasoning behind them can be found on the Court's website.

BAR OF THE COURT

During the October 2022 Term, 158 attorneys were admitted to practice before the Court, bringing the cumulative total of admissions to the Bar of the Court to 37,942.

JUDICIAL OUTREACH

The practice known as "Project Outreach" was developed as part of a public awareness program to demonstrate the operation of a federal Court of Appeals and the military's criminal justice system. During the October 2022 term, with the consent of the parties, the Court conducted hearings at the University of San Diego Law School and at Naval Base San Diego.

CONTINUING LEGAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAM

In May 2023, the Court held its Continuing Legal Education and Training Program at the George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School in Arlington, VA. The program opened with welcoming remarks from the Honorable Kevin A. Ohlson, Chief Judge, United States Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces. He preceded the following speakers: Colonel Frederic L. APPENDIX A

United States v. Hasan, ___ M.J. ____ [C.A.A.F. 2023]. In a 118-page opinion, the Court addressed eleven issues briefed by the Appellant in this mandatory review case. After carefully considering his raised issues and the record, the Court concluded that Appellant was not entitled to relief and affirmed the judgment of the lower court, to include a sentence to death.

United States v. Jeter, _____ M.J. ____ [C.A.A.F. 2023]. The question in this case was whether it is appropriate for a convening authority to consider race when deciding which members should be appointed to a court-martial panel. The majority found that this Court's precedent, allowing a convening authority to depart from the panel selection criteria in Article 25, UCMJ, was no longer good law. The Appellant made an unrebutted showing that race may have entered the selection process, requiring reversal of his conviction. The dissent agreed with both the trial judge and lower court that Appellant had not shown the convening authority acted improperly or that racial discrimination occurred.

M.W. v. United States, ____ M.J. ____ [C.A.A.F. 2023]. The question in this case was whether the Court had the jurisdiction to review a decision of a Court of Criminal Appeals at the request of a "victim of an offense" as that term is used in Article 6b, UCMJ. The Court re-affirmed a prior decision that, despite amendments to Article 6b, it lacks jurisdiction to review a petition filed by a victim of an offense. The Court's decision rested solely on the statutory language of the UCMJ. It does not reflect any policy decision about whether this Court should have statutory jurisdiction.

United States v. Anderson, 83 M.J. 291 [C.A.A.F. 2023]. The question in this case was whether courts-martial defendants have a right to a unanimous guilty verdict under the Sixth Amendment, the Fifth Amendment Due Process Clause, or the Fifth Amendment component of equal protections. The Court determined that courtmartial defendants do not have the right to a unanimous guilty verdict.


























Total Opinions Per Year








Days from Petition Filing to Oral Argument
