Mr. Martin Mitchell teaches Lawyer Bargaining as an adjunct associate professor of law with the Washington College of Law at American University. Mr. Mitchell's is also a frequent CLE lecturer on the topics of legal ethics, appellate practice, military justice, and constitutional law. Mr. Mitchell has instructed trial and appellate judges on the limits of independent research, judicial canons, conflicts and recusals at the Fulton Conference, the Army Judge Advocate's School of Law and the Court of Appeals of Armed Forces annual training.

Mr. Mitchell retired as a Colonel in the United States Air Force after more than twenty-one years of service. Mr. Mitchell's assignments with the Air Force included trial counsel, area defense counsel, circuit defense counsel, and chief circuit defense counsel. Mr. Mitchell also served as a military trial judge and appellate military judge. Along with his work in the courtroom, Mr. Mitchell was a labor and employment attorney and staff judge advocate for a cyber operations wing and an air mobility wing. Mr. Mitchell culminated his Air Force career as the Director of Civil Law and Litigation (JAC), where he supervised a staff of 280 attorneys, paralegals and support personnel at 38 duty locations who represent the Air Force in labor and employment, claims and tort litigation, and environmental law and litigation.

In 2016, Mr. Mitchell was appointed by President Obama to serve as an appellate military judge on the U.S. Court of Military Commissions Review. Mr. Mitchell was a commissioner at the US Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces. He is

currently a Veterans Law Judge with the Board of Veterans Appeals with the Department of Veterans Affairs.
