

The Supreme Court and Mass Incarceration

Professor Rachel E. Barkow

Charles Seligson Professor of Law, NYU School of Law

Rachel Barkow is the Charles Seligson Professor of Law and the Faculty Director of the Zimroth Center on the Administration of Criminal Law at NYU. In June 2013, the Senate confirmed her as a Member of the United States Sentencing Commission, where she served until January 2019. From 2010 to 2020, she was a member of the Manhattan District Attorney's Office Conviction Integrity Policy Advisory Panel.

She has written more than 40 articles and essays and is the co-editor of a leading casebook on criminal law. She received the university-wide teaching award at NYU in 2013 and the law school teaching award in 2007. After graduating from Northwestern University (B.A. 1993), Barkow attended Harvard Law School (J.D. 1996), where she won the Sears Prize. Barkow served as a law clerk to Judge Laurence H. Silberman on the District of Columbia Circuit, and Justice Antonin Scalia on the U.S. Supreme Court. Barkow was an associate at Kellogg, Huber, Hansen, Todd, & Evans, PLLC, in Washington, D.C., from 1998-2002.
