His prior books include *Lawyer Nation: The Past, Present, and Future of the American Legal Profession* and *The Future of Change: How Technology Shapes Social Revolutions* (Cornell University Press, 2020). He is also the editor of several volumes including *Crisis Lawyering: Effective Legal Advocacy in Emergency Situations* (NYU Press, 2021). Prior to joining the academy, he was the Associate Director of the Urban Justice Center in New York; a Skadden Fellow at The Legal Aid Society of New York; and law clerk to the Hon. Constance Baker Motley, U.S. District Court Judge for the Southern District of New York. He received his J.D. from Yale Law School and his B.A. from Fordham University.
